
## Key Points of Information BATHROOM ACCESS FOR TRANSGENDER STUDENTS

Denying bathroom access to transgender students puts them at greater risk of sexual assault.

- According to a 2019 study conducted at Harvard, transgender and gender- nonbinary teens face a greater risk of sexual assault in schools that prevent them from using bathrooms or locker rooms consistent with their gender identity.
- A survey of nearly 3700 U.S. trans and nonbinary teens aged 13-17 found 35% of transgender or gender nonbinary students with restricted bathroom or locker room access reported being sexually assaulted in the prior 12 months vs. 26% of all students surveyed.
- Transgender girls had 2.5x the assault risk when they had to use restrooms and locker rooms for boys compared to trans girls whose restroom use was unrestricted.
- Single-person facilities (e.g., a staff restroom) may not fully address the risks associated with restrictions, as using one may "out" a student as transgender.



- 85% of these students reported depressive moods, and 60% seriously considered suicide. 1 in 3 reported a past-year suicide attempt, with 1 in 5 reporting multiple suicide attempts.
- TGNB youth without gender-affirming bathroom options were 1.3x, 1.4x, and 1.7x more likely to 2 report depressive mood, serious suicide consideration, and multiple suicide attempts, respectively, than TGNB youth without bathroom barriers.
- The American Medical Association points out that exclusionary policies force transgender students to decide whether to violate the policy and face potential disciplinary actions, use a bathroom that doesn't match their identity, use a special bathroom that isolates and "outs" them, or not use any restroom at all.
- Being denied access to a safe bathroom makes it difficult to concentrate and focus on school, or causes avoidance of social activities.
- The medical consequences of avoiding bathroom needs include recurrent urinary tract infections and constipation as well as more serious issues, including hematuria (blood in urine) and chronic kidney disease.



- It is a myth that non-discriminatory bathroom policies increase the danger to girls and women in female-designated bathrooms and locker rooms.
- Researchers at the Williams Institute compared restroom crime reports in Massachusetts in demographically matched cities and found no empirical evidence that allowing access to toilets conforming to one's gender identity leads to an increase in sex crimes.
- The study also found that reports of privacy and safety violations in public restrooms, locker rooms, and changing rooms are exceedingly rare.
- rooms are exceedingly rare.
  As of 2016, hundreds of cities, school districts, and 18 states had laws protecting transgender people's rights to use gender-identity-matching restrooms. None had seen a rise in incidents of people attacking anyone or of people pretending

to be transgender in order to gain access to restrooms.
